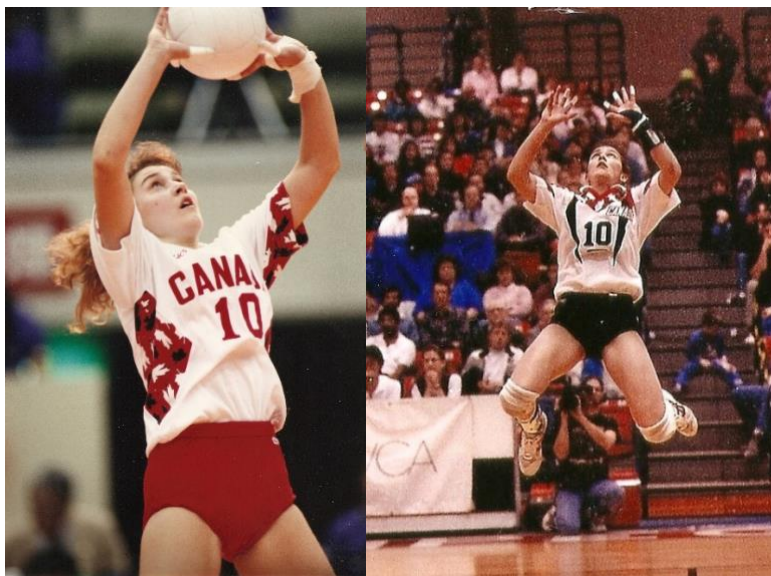


SASK VOLLEYBALL HALL OF FAME

LORI-ANN MUNDT

Lori-Ann Mundt started her volleyball career in 1984 with the Yorkton Blitz Volleyball Club. She attended Yorkdale Junior High where she received the Junior High Special Athletic Achievement Award, and followed that with the Female Athlete of the Year in 1986.

1987-1989 Lori-Ann played for the Yorkton Raiders High School team and the Yorkton Blitz Club team. In 1989 she received an all-star award at the Canadian Juvenile National Championships in Halifax where her team finished 5th. She was named the Sask Volleyball Midget Player of the Year in 1987, Juvenile Player of the Year in 1989, and was also the Sask Volleyball Laurie Anne Leier Memorial Award recipient for Athletic and Academic Excellence in 1989.

Lori-Ann represented Team Saskatchewan from 1986 – 1989. She played on the 1989 Canada Games team that captured the Gold Medal in Saskatoon, SK, and received the Provincial Achievement Award in recognition of Outstanding Achievement at the Jeux Canada Games from the Government of Saskatchewan.

She played at the University of Regina from 1989-1991 and was part of the 21U Junior team that won the Canadian Junior Championships and was named a tournament all-star. During her time at the U of R she received the Female Athlete of the Year, MVP for Women's Volleyball, All Canadian Rookie of the Year, 1st Team All-Star – Great Plains Athletic Conference and All -Star at the CIAU tournament, and was the recipient of the Olympic Torch Scholarship Fund in 1990.

Lori-Ann joined the National Team program in 1990. She played from 1990-1996, and 2001-2003. During her time with the National team she played in the Pan American Games in Argentina & Cuba, World Championships in Japan, Canada Cup in Winnipeg, Norceca Championships in Dominican Republic, Colorado Springs & Regina, and the World Universiade Games in Buffalo & Japan. Lori-Ann was the Captain of Team Canada from 1992-1995. The highlight of her National Team career came in 1996 when she played for Team Canada at the 1996 Olympic Games in Atlanta, Georgia, USA.
